But, what about those who are on the outside of your church building; those searching for meaning in this holiday season; those looking for a place to be invited in and welcomed with outstretched arms of grace and love?



From our Transitional Presbyter,

Dear Partners in Ministry,

Yes, the season is upon us. Red and green lights are twinkling, the air is filled with the sound of carols, presents are piling up under the tree as our celebration of Christmas is but a few short weeks away. But as strange as it may sound, that is not the season that I'm thinking of. While we may be preparing for our celebration of Christmas, I would like to suggest that our celebration of that Holy Day will be incomplete without our first embracing the season of Advent, that wondrous liturgical season which helps prepare our minds and our

hearts for the celebration of Christ coming into our lives not only in the Bethlehem stable, not only at the end of the age when Christ's kingdom will be fully established, but to prepare us for the coming of Christ into our lives right here and right now.

The call of Advent beckons us to the wilderness that we might examine our lives and clear out all of those things which prohibit our fully experiencing the coming of Christ into our lives. During Advent we are challenged to listen again to the call of the prophet Isaiah and John the Baptist as they encourage us to "Prepare the way of the Lord!"

As the prophet Isaiah proclaims the coming of God into the lives of his people, God informs them that there is some major work to be done beforehand. The work required is described in terms of the building of a major thoroughfare through the wilderness. Brush and debris will have to be cut down and hauled away. Rocks and mountains must be blasted away, and valleys filled in. That's hard work, but as Isaiah promises, it will be worth it, for this new way will be a "Glory Road," on which God's glory will be revealed for all to see. John the Baptist echoes Isaiah's call to return to the wilderness. It was to the wilderness that Jesus was sent to be tempted following his baptism. It was the wilderness where Jesus took his disciples to prepare them for ministry. Throughout the Bible, the wilderness is where God's scattered people are re-gathered as the people of God and drawn back to the fundamentals of the faith. Heeding John's call to go back to the wilderness provides us with the opportunity to confront the trappings of those things that rob our lives of meaning and which distance us from God's presence: unresolved guilt, unfulfilled expectations, envy, arrogance, or even a struggle with our own self-worth. It may also include our buying into our consumption-oriented society hook, line and sinker, the idea that whoever dies with the most stuff wins, or the more we have, the greater others will think we are. John's summons to join him is an invitation to take a few steps backwards in reflection and repentance, that we may clear the way to our hearts and move forward in forgiveness, faith, and obedience.

While it is easy for us to be excited and rush into the clamor and chaos of Christmas, during these next few weeks, let's take care to hit the pause button, and take the time to reflect on what we need to do to prepare our minds and hearts for the coming of Christ into our lives, even before December 25th.


Officer Training Saturday, December 9 9:00am—12:00 noon via ZOOM

Matthew 25: Doing What We Already Do; Becoming What We Already Are!

The Albertville congregation, where I serve as Stated Supply, recently signed on to become a Matthew 25 congregation. I am happy to report that there was no arm-twisting or coercion involved in that process.

Jason Boatfield was our representative to the fall meeting of North Alabama Presbytery at Maranatha not long ago. He has been to Presbytery meetings several times before, but this is the first time he and I had attended that meeting together. Most of you will remember that the fall meeting included a presentation from a staff person from the denominational center in Louisville about Matthew 25. Jason had helped set up the display of material and resources that supported that presentation. Early in the meeting Lauren Rogers, NAP's Ministry Engagement Advisor, stood up to make her presentation, and we all listened politely. About halfway through her talk, Jason leaned over to me and said, "Isn't that all stuff we're already doing?" Of course it was. So then he said, "Why haven't we signed up?"

Jason and I talked about Matthew 25 on the way home that day. The three main emphases of Matthew 25, as most of you know, are: 1) building congregational vitality; 2) dismantling structural racism; and 3) eradicating systemic poverty. In a small congregation like ours, everything we do is designed to increase the vitality of our congregation. We may not do all the programming that larger churches do, but we constantly look for ways to show ourselves and our community that we are alive and open to the leadership of God's Spirit. Like many congregations in North Alabama Presbytery, we are mostly white, but we welcome people of all races and identities who worship with us. We are surrounded by people in need, just as most churches are. We regularly help our local Blessings in a Backpack effort to provide food during school breaks for area school children. The first time we did this since we've been here was when someone said we needed to provide 1,000 pouches of oatmeal for that program, I will admit that I wondered how much oatmeal that meant I'd have to buy. The second week of our collection, we brought more than 1300 oatmeal packs. We took the surplus to a school in our area not served by Blessings in a Backpack. That's just one way we try to help beyond ourselves. We have collected school supplies and cleaning supplies for

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. We made homemade ice cream and asked people to pay to eat it and sent the proceeds to the Presbyterian Home for Children. We just finished our effort to help our local Christmas Coalition and to send money for gifts to the Presbyterian Home for Children.

When our Session met shortly after that meeting, we took some of the information we had gotten at Presbytery about Matthew 25 and talked about the goal of the program. Everyone on the Session joined Jason in saying, "We already do those things! Let's join others who are doing them, too!"

We are thankful for opportunities we have had to respond to God's call to serve in our community and beyond. We are not done yet! We are delighted to join with other congregations in our Presbytery and beyond who have heard God's call to serve others. For us, it's not a burden. It's doing what we already do. It's becoming who we already are!

From our Ministry Engagement Advisor, Lauren Rogers.....

Recently I was listening to one of my favorite podcasts on which Nadia Bolz-Weber, author and ordained Lutheran pastor, was a guest. She recalled a conversation with a friend where the friend asked her, "Why is community so important." Her answer stopped me in my tracks: "Because giving and receiving is the economy of our souls. We must give and receive help, and love, and forgiveness, and because the Lord in his mercy created us as fleshy musical instruments, and no matter how hard I try, I cannot sing harmony alone."

I had to rewind and listen to this a handful more times. "No matter how hard I try, I cannot sing harmony alone."

In Matthew 25, we are called to a big task- to feed the hungry, provide drink to the thirsty, invite in the stranger, clothe the naked, look after the sick and imprisoned. That's a tall order, but it's not impossible! Especially when we join our hands, hearts, and voices with others.

Earlier this fall, North Alabama officially signed on to be a Matthew 25 presbytery. Not only have you strengthened the PC(USA)'s efforts to serve "the least of these," but you are also strengthening your own efforts to be a church of action in North Alabama. By adding your voice to the choir, you are joining over one thousand PC(USA) congregations and over 90 mid-councils who have made this work a priority. This opens you up to a network of resources and connections to guide you in your ministry. I look forward to seeing how North Alabama Presbytery lives into the Matthew 25 call, and I can't wait to share *your stories* with the wider denomination. Advent is the season of hope. Frederick Buechner wrote, "For Christians, hope is ultimately hope in Christ. The hope that he really is what for centuries we have been claiming he is. The hope that despite the fact that sin and death still rule the world, he somehow conquered them. The hope that in him and through him all of us stand a chance of somehow conquering them too. The hope that at some unforeseeable time and in some unimaginable way he will return with healing in his wings."

I agree with Buechner – Christians are people of hope. It is hope that moves us forward in our lives. Whenever I think of hope, I think of love and faith. *Faith, hope, and love, and the greatest of these is love.* [Paraphrase of 1 Cor 13:13]. Hope does move us forward, along with its traveling companions, faith and love.

I've spent a lot of 2023 on the road, alone in my car, just my files and my phone, and a lot of pavement in my rearview mirror. I am never alone in my car — music, books, stories, podcasts, and even phone calls keep me entertained, keep me awake, and keep me moving forward. I am always hopeful of my directions, and that I will arrive when and where the GPS tells me I will arrive.

In worship at the October 17 Presbytery meeting, Rev. Brandon Miles reminded us that we are connected in faith and hope, and called to proclaim the grace of God. He said we have a life lived in love already given to us in Christ Jesus. Later in the meeting, Transitional EP Tom Lovell voiced a concern about the struggles churches are facing, but stated he sees in North Alabama a vitality in ministry and mission. He encouraged North Alabama Presbytery to look forward in faith, to see what God is already doing, and to be bold enough and dare to be faithful.

I would say to all of us – that is hope! It is hope that prods us, encourages us, and keeps us moving forward as we seek to be God's faithful people. Let us have hope in Christ so that we can indeed conquer the things that try to hold us back. Let us live in hope as we work together with faith and love to live out the ministry Jesus Christ calls us to do.

This Advent season, take a few minutes to reflect on what was in your rearview mirror. What times of hope (and faith and love) did you encounter? How will hope propel you forward? And this Advent season, remember to take the time to give thanks for the One who brought us faith and love, and most importantly, hope.

The deadlines are as follows:

Statistics open to clerks of sessions: December 1, 2023
Deadline for clerks of sessions to file report: February 15, 2024

If you are unable to get your report filed by the February 15th deadline, I can file the report for you. You will need to get me the report before March 1, 2024.

Per capita payments to the Synod of Living Waters, the Office of the General Assembly, and North Alabama Presbytery are based on membership numbers reported by the churches. The number of Presbytery teaching and ruling elder commissioners to the General Assembly is based on the membership numbers reported by churches. And North Alabama periodically reviews parity in ruling and teaching elder commissioners, also based on the session annual statistical reports.


Final contribution statements for 2023 will be emailed in early January for all payments received by December 31st.


