

⁴¹⁻⁴² That day about three thousand took him at his word, were baptized and were signed up. They committed themselves to the teaching of the apostles, the life together, the common meal, and the prayers.

⁴³⁻⁴⁵ Everyone around was in awe—all those wonders and signs done through the apostles! And all the believers lived in a wonderful harmony, holding everything in common. They sold whatever they owned and pooled their resources so that each person's need was met.

⁴⁶⁻⁴⁷ They followed a daily discipline of worship in the Temple followed by meals at home, every meal a celebration, exuberant and joyful, as they praised God. People in general liked what they saw. Every day their number grew as God added those who were saved. **The Message**

From our Executive Presbyter, Dr. Tom Lovell...

Dear Partners in Ministry,

Grace and peace to you in the name of our risen Lord, Jesus Christ, who, through the power of the Holy Spirit gives us new life. As we move through the first few weeks of May, the liturgical calendar

reminds us that it is still Eastertide and beckons us to continue to reflect on what it means to live as God's Easter people. Then, on May 19th, the focus will shift a bit as we celebrate the Day of Pentecost and seek to discover what it means for God's Easter people to also live as God's Spirit-filled people. The story of Pentecost described for us in the Book of Acts is one of the most dramatic stories within the Bible. Imagine what it would have been like to have been among those gathered in Jerusalem as the mighty wind of God's Spirit rushed through the windows and doors and flaming tongues of fire danced around the room. Imagine what it would have been like to hear the good news of Jesus Christ in your own language. Imagine what it would have been like to be touched by God's Holy Spirit and have your life changed forever, for that is what God's Holy Spirit does. It changes everything it touches.

Change: perhaps that is why we sometimes seem fearful of God's Holy Spirit. As those who study the Bible, we know that whenever God's Spirit shows up some pretty dramatic, strange, unusual, frightening, and uncontrollable things happen. But I hope we also know not only from our study of the scriptures, but from our own experience that when God's Holy Spirit shows up some pretty incredible, amazing, and life-giving things happen as well. The opening words of Genesis tell us that it was God's Spirit which gave life to the world and everything in it and breathed life into the first humans. It was God's Spirit that enlivened the dry bones in Ezekiel's vision and emboldened the prophets to speak God's Word to the people. The angel Gabriel told Mary that God's Spirit would come upon her and empower her to give birth to the Savior of the world. And on the Day of Pentecost, amidst the wind, fire, and smoke, God's Holy Spirit blew into Jerusalem and not only filled Jesus' disciples, but all who were gathered in such a powerful and personal way that over 3,000 people came to believe in Jesus Christ and the Christian Church was born. Yes, when God's Holy Spirit shows up, some pretty incredible, and even miraculous things happen. And while the presence and power of the Holy Spirit may be a bit frightening, my hope and prayer is that as we celebrate Pentecost on May 19th we will do so with open minds and hearts that we may discover what it means to live as God's Spirit-filled people.

EUCHARISTIC ELDER TRAINING

One of the responsibilities of the Presbytery is to provide worship leadership for our While the majority of our congregations. congregations have ordained pastoral leadership, almost one-third of our congregations do not. That reality often makes it difficult for those congregations to celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper on a regular basis.

In response to that reality, and in accord with the authority granted by the Book of Order, the Commission on Ministry (COM) is seeking Ruling Elders who are interested in being trained to serve the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in those congregations without ordained worship leadership. These elders will be called, "Eucharistic Elders," and upon completion of their training will be authorized by the COM to serve the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper in specific circumstances and congregations.

The training will be conducted by our Executive Presbyter, Dr. Tom Lovell, and our Stated Clerk, the Rev. Tom Lewis.

The training will be Saturday, July 27, 2024 at Faith Presbyterian Church, Huntsville from 9:00am until 12:00 Noon.

Eucharistic Elders will need to be endorsed by their Pastor or the Session.

Fellowship Presbyterian Church, Huntsville. The Presbyterian Women Community Involvement Project rolled up their sleeves and helped build bunk beds on April 20th for Sleep in Heavenly Peace, a national foundation, with a THEW β chapter in Huntsville, that works to provide safe beds and bedding for children who don't have a good place to sleep. In partnership with Church St. Cumberland Presbyterian Church and the Honor Students from Alabama A & M University, Fellowship was able to build several beds and providing bedding sets for children in the greater

Huntsville community. To help fund this project, the youth of Fellowship held a Bake Sale that raised \$4,800!



The vision of *Sleep in Heavenly Peace* is a simple one—No child in our town sleeps on the floor! This national foundation fully believes that a bed is a basic need for the proper physical, emotional, and mental support that a child needs and is striving to make a difference in the quality of life for children across the country.

How it works:

Donations—individuals, businesses and organizations donate bedding and building materials. Volunteers — individuals and groups team up with local chapters and organize a build day. **Build Day**—volunteers from the community build beds together.

Applications—are received from families in the community who are in need of a child's bed.

Delivery—volunteers deliver and set up beds for families in need.

First Presbyterian Church, Huntsville. How it works:

Donations—food donations of shelf staple items such as milk, juice boxes, ready to eat meals, and fruit are received, sorted, and readied for packing.

Volunteers—pack paper bags and deliver them to AAA or Second Mile Preschool . School Counselors—each Friday, the bags are discreetly placed in the backpacks of children who are living with food insecurity.

Program:

- Camp Starts on June 2nd for Overnight Camp and June 3rd for Day Camp.
- The theme for this summer is Survivor. Our theme verse is Romans 8:37.
- We are separating Overnight Camp and Day Camp a little more this summer. The only thing they will really be doing together is the morning rally.

We are going to add a water slide to our inflatables this summer to expand the waterfront area a little more.

Dining Hall:

- We are working on the punch list to finish up the project. We have about 50 things on the final punch list. Many of them are duplicates because of multiple bathrooms and most of them are little things to finish up.
- We have built the serving line walls and have ordered the shutters for that area.

Projects:

- We received the wood to re-deck the dock. We will be working on this in the next couple of weeks to get ready for summer.
- We are painting the bathhouse and putting up partitions for changing areas. We have fixed the roof leaks and re-run the electrical in the building. This should be a great area for the day campers this summer.

- We have to re-run some of our guy wires for the zip line tower per our inspections.
- From the last storm, we had several trees come down at our outdoor chapel area and throughout camp. We had three trees fall on the power lines at the cabin circle. No buildings were damaged, but it did bring the power lines down. The power company came and fixed the poles and re-ran the wire the same day. We still have to remove the debris.

- We received a generous donation of \$38,000 this month.
- We are receiving about \$1,500 in monthly giving. TV Cursillo has donated some sound equipment, meeting room equipment, coffee pots, skit supplies and several other items to the camp.
